## Wrestlingworth's Commonwealth War Graves

As the country prepares to commemorate the end of World War I it seems timely to delve a little into the history of the two servicemen whose graves are in Wrestlingworth Burial Ground. Tucked away in the far corner there are two Commonwealth War Graves:



### **22099 Private Albert Medlock 1st Battalion Bedfordshire Regiment**

Albert died of his wounds in England on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> October 1916 aged 29. He was the son of Jonah and Jane Medlock. Like his father, Albert was a farm labourer. He was one of six children although two of his siblings died as children. The family lived at 64 Village Street, close by the Queen Victoria pub. On Albert's death his father was paid a war gratuity of £11.3s.5d, which has a current purchasing power of about £900.

Albert's death was registered at South Stoneham in Hampshire. There was a military hospital The Royal Victoria, at Stoneham during WWI it could well be that Albert died there.

Albert enlisted at Amptill, one third of the soldiers who enlisted there and trained at Amptill Park were killed. The 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion were heavily engaged in the Battle of the Somme in 1916 but I have been unable to discover if that was where Albert was wounded.



### **5287 Private Edwin Endersby 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion Bedfordshire Regiment**

He was the son of Edith and Charles Endersby of Dartford House, Hatley End, which at the time was in the parish of Cockayne Hatley. The 1911 census shows the family living at Water End. Then Edwin, aged 14, was already working alongside his father as a farm labourer. At that time five of the family's six children were living at home.

Edwin enlisted on 7<sup>th</sup> June 1915 at the age of 18. He was discharged due to sickness nearly a year later on 8<sup>th</sup> April 1916 and died at home on 4<sup>th</sup> June 1917 aged 20. The 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion were deployed in Gallipoli during this time and military records note that "Soldiers in this theatre of war suffered notably from illness, with the battalion losing considerably more men to local diseases than enemy fire".

## Restoration of Turret

Time and weather continues to take its toll on the fabric of St. Peter's Church. In the Quinquennial Inspection Report published last year concerns were raised about the condition of certain sections of masonry in the turret and also in a number of ground floor windows. Unfortunately it has taken us a year just to complete the groundwork before initiating the restoration programme.



The turret has been given a thorough inspection by a structural engineer and although it is showing wear and tear it is structurally sound. However, the cordon will remain in place until further notice.

St. Peter's church is of architectural and historical significance and so we have applied to be included in the Historic England Heritage at Risk database. The church has been inspected by a conservation specialist and our application accepted. This means that when we apply for funding, grant-making trusts will look at us more sympathetically.

We intend that the repairs will be completed in two stages starting with the turret for which the plans and specifications have been drawn up. Tenders have already been invited and we are awaiting the quotes. Three trusts have also been approached who are willing to receive an application for funding once the final figures are known. This will not be a cheap project as the price of building materials is increasing; the clunch, a chalky limestone that is used in the turret, is no longer readily available from local clunch pits and so it will have to be obtained from further afield.

Restoration work is a long process but we hope you will support us in our endeavours to keep our beautiful church in good condition.

## Grade 2 listed Headstone



As you are probably aware, St. Peter's church is a Grade 1 listed building and in the churchyard we are fortunate to also have a number of Grade 2 listed headstones from the 17th and early 18th centuries. We are delighted to report that another headstone has been awarded listed status by Historic England

namely that of Ricardus Thistlethwaite who died in 1657. This stone, which now brings the total number of listed headstones to nineteen, is to be found on the south side of the church below the sanctuary window.

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## “MAKING A STAND FOR CHELSEA”

“Making a Stand for Chelsea” and the Royal College of Pathologists – what could possibly be the connection? In August Dr. Tim Wreghitt OBE explained all to a full house boosted by members from Sutton WI and Potton Ladies. He gave an excellent presentation.

Persuaded to enter a stand at the Chelsea Flower Show in 2003, “Plants in Pathology” won a Silver Medal and raised awareness of the Science of Pathology. Spurred on by its success they entered each year with a different theme, and each time winning a medal until in 2007 they won their first Gold Medal with “Plants and Food Allergies.”

We learned of the various uses of plants we know well and the medicines we get from them:

Foxgloves (*digitalis*) for heart disease; Willow (*aspirin*) many uses including helping with miscarriage; Tea tree for stomach ulcers; Manukah whose honey is anti-bacterial; Chinese Wormwood (*artemesia*) for malaria; Periwinkle (*vinca*) for myeloma; Yew for ovarian cancer; and even cranberries help with cystitis! The list is endless and finally I found out what Peruvian Bark is – constantly dispensed by Dr. Enys in the “Poldark” novels – it was the 18<sup>th</sup> century name for the source of quinine.

September is our Centenary Celebration (more about our party in the next issue of *The Village Link* when I hope to have lots of photographs). Another celebration - two of our members Rosemary Chapman (far right) and Jackie McDonald recently celebrated their ‘significant’ birthdays – I won’t give away how many - and they were both presented with a bouquet.



We have had some great speakers so far this year and there are more to come. Following our Annual October “Chilli Evening”, Keith Baldwin’s talk in November is entitled “When Doctors and Policemen start to look young” – don’t I know it.

## LETTER FROM PERU

Our latest adventure began with a familiar early morning alarm call, at the not so welcome wake-up time of 2.30 am. There followed a very early morning taxi journey to Heathrow, which culminated in a 13 hour plane ride involving two separate carriers. Eventually, we arrived at our destination where darkness had again enveloped our world and, exhausted, we succumbed immediately to sleep at our hotel.



The next morning, the sun rose to light up the City of Lima – the capital of Peru. This was to be a “whistle-stop” tour involving a total of 17 nights, to savour a few of the many sights + places of interest in this area of South America. Lima, with its historic centre, presented us with an introduction to local life past & present – especially the Larco museum.

However, I thought Machu Picchu was to be the highlight of this particular trip and I was impatient to get there. Ever since youth, my imagination had been fired by tales of the Incas and their massive feats of sophisticated building – without wheels and iron tools - using only rudimentary aids. Throw into the mix a relatively recent history, a vast & complex empire (both in terms of population and land area), stories of gold and a rapacious invading force then here were the ingredients of a story worth following.

Starting in the Sacred (Urubamba) Valley, following an internal flight and a long road journey, we joined a dedicated train for the final leg of this particular adventure. There, high up on a man-made plateau set between two mountain peaks, the Inca ruins were suddenly revealed. One of the Seven Wonders of the (modern) World, the site itself is huge, atmospheric and very photogenic; in fact, everything you’ve ever seen and heard about Machu Picchu – except a great deal more.

At nearly 8,000 feet in altitude this was a remote, yet fully functional & self-governing town comprised many stone buildings. Aside from houses and streets for the estimated several hundred residents who lived there, there were meeting places, a school, temples and many food storage sites; in fact, all the infrastructure – including canals and (gravity-fed) running water – required to sustain such a large population. Built in the 15<sup>th</sup> century, it was never discovered by the Spanish but was later abandoned and subsequently forgotten, until a chance re-discovery in 1911.

Overawed and impressed as I was, imagine my complete surprise to admit that my 3-day cruise on the River Amazon topped even that! Following yet another lengthy internal flight (plus car journey), we boarded a small ship which was to be our touring hotel & floating berth for 4 nights. The river at Nauta must be fully a half-mile wide and, given the high & turbulent flood conditions existing then, not conducive – I thought – to observing the Natural World.



However, hardly had we stepped aboard when we were jolted by shouts of the crew. There, not 40 feet off the stern, were a pod of grey river dolphin “rolling” in our wake. This was to be repeated several times over the next few days – always the grey species, not the pink variety. (Even now, it seems churlish in the extreme even to note it). In that time we enjoyed 3 different river safaris daily using a small

skiff to explore various tributaries and the flooded wetland of the great Pacaya-Samiria Reserve, which runs alongside the Amazon & Ucayali Rivers at this point.

The wildlife was truly breath-taking. Everywhere were “fields” of solid-looking, but free-floating water hyacinths alive with ducks of all hues + colours. Overhead flew continuous flocks of noisy parrots or macaws. We saw deer & both varieties of sloth, plus a multitude of different monkey-types along the riverbanks. The bird life was truly incalculable; be it herons, egrets, nighthawks, kingfishers, woodpeckers, swifts, hawks, vultures or any number of other weirdly named, yet always colourful, feathered relatives. This array was matched in numbers by the varieties of frogs, bats, butterflies, lizards, snakes and spiders – including the huge, bird-eating type!

In nine “river safaris” we also completed a rainforest trek, visited a small & remote Indian village, explored waterways at dusk into darkness, enjoyed piranha fishing & viewed the Confluence – where the 2 great rivers of the region actually merge, giving rise to the immense river known as the Amazon. We even went swimming in the Amazon..... but that is a story for another time!!

## MINI BEASTS IN OUR MIDST

James Bonfield of the Parish Walking & Wildlife Group encourages us to look down towards the ground and appreciate the little beasts that lurk there.

Living in a landscape of wide open spaces and fantastic skies, we can be forgiven for not looking downwards at the minutiae, but, take some time, it's well worth it. No, I don't mean looking at the phone, but beyond that to the ground, to the vegetation and the bugs and beasties lurking within. At the time of writing, the grass in my garden has turned brown, but the weeds are still growing of course, and show a variety of species that attract insects.

Standing out are the ever present Dandelions, White Clovers and Ribwort Plantain, all of which have beautiful flowers and seed heads when seen up close. The clover in particular is a favourite of bees, so it is well worth leaving an area to go wild. Amongst the roots of the grass you'll see lots of small mauve flower spikes of Selfheal, apparently named after its ability to help heal wounds. At the less often cut edges you might find a clover relative, Black Medick, as well as Smooth Hawk's-Beard, another member of the Dandelion family. These yellow flowers are often covered in tiny pollen beetles and are frequented by one of our smaller and most common hoverflies, the delightfully-named Marmalade Fly. In the more wild areas of my cottage garden I find the small, hairy, but nonetheless interesting flower of the climbing White Bryony.



Even moss, that scourge of many a gardener, can be beautiful when viewed close up and must appear to be a veritable forest to the tiny creatures within. It has surprising amount of variety too, from mats of fern-like structures to tall spires (sporophytes) from which the tiny spores are launched.

However, the micro world isn't just restricted to the ground. Other flat surfaces such as walls, posts and tree trunks offer their own unique habitats. Several of our local footpath way-mark posts are covered in bright yellow lichens, with bizarre looking cups and folds.



It's not hard to find a wide mix of insects too including the fantastic looking Labyrinth spiders - they're the ones which make little funnels in the grass to protect their eggs in a maze of webs – and let's not forget the plethora of stunning butterflies. Look closely and you'll see that their eyes are often spotted, as on this Ringlet butterfly. Finally, hovering over their domain are the lords and ladies of the insect world, the Dragonflies. Close up this Common Darter looks a formidable beast - I am glad they are only the size they are!

*The Parish Walking and Wildlife group organises monthly walks on the third Sunday of the month in the morning, and manages the Lousy Bush Nature Reserve (off the bridle path between Water End and the Sutton Road). All are welcome on our walks (£1 per walker) including dogs, although we reserve the right to ask for them to be put on the lead if necessary. Forthcoming walks details:*

***Sunday October 21<sup>st</sup>*** - a local walk of approximately 7 miles taking in Sunderland Farm, John O Gaunt and skirting Pegnut Wood. Meet at The Chequers at 10am.

***Sunday November 18<sup>th</sup>*** – taking in elements of the Long Walk which featured in the August/September issue of the Village Link, this 8-10 mile walk starts at the car park next to the Edward VII pub, Steeple Morden at 10am.

## **Trial and error cooking by Gordon Blue (assisted by Egon Ronnie)**

### **MINCE CURRY (Serves two or three people)**

This recipe is for people who want a quick tasty meal, which doesn't take long to prepare.

#### **Ingredients:-**

Generous dash of olive oil  
4 medium size carrots  
3 medium size potatoes  
1 medium size courgette  
1 medium onion  
200g of mince  
Large table spoon of gravy granules  
Large table spoon of curry powder  
200g of Greek style yogurt or any plain yogurt

#### **Method**

After adding the olive oil to the frying pan and heating it up, add in the carrots and potatoes which should be pre-cut into bite size pieces.

These go in first because they will take the longest to cook.

Then add the courgette and the medium onion, both of which should be chopped beforehand.


When all is cooked and looking soft and slightly brown, add the mince, which should be sprinkled on top of what you have already cooked and stirred in until it too is cooked.

While this is going on, in a jug add some gravy granules and some curry powder, the latter to suit your own taste with regard to how hot you want it to taste. Then pour some boiling water over it, enough to form what looks like a thick but just pourable gravy mix. Then pour the mixture into the frying pan and stir until all the existing ingredients are covered.

Finally add the yoghurt and stir this in as well and then serve.
