

It was agreed that a Village Appraisal should be undertaken. It is just over 10 years since the last such survey, and it should be useful to evaluate the changes in the community in that time.



A letter has been sent to all householders whose property adjoins the Wrestlingworth Brook. It is proposed that detailed photographs of the brook and culvets be displayed at the Annual Parish Meeting to be held on 20th May at the Hall, Cockayne Hatley. Interested parties should attend.



# PARISH PATH PARTNERSHIP

The Countryside Commission, in association with the National Association of Local Councils, is encouraging a partnership between highway authorities, and Local Councils and voluntary groups to keep rights of way open and in use.

Rights of way are the single most important way of enjoying the English Countryside, but many are blocked and in poor condition. The Countryside Commission believes that the entire rights of way network should be legally defined, properly maintained and well publicised by the year 2000, a target endorsed by Government.

The Parish Council are keen to set up a committee to undertake rights of way work. Grants will be available to conduct surveys to assess work to be done, to develop and up grade paths, to assist in publicity to help people to be aware of the rights of way network, and to organise guided walks.

The Parish Council have written to the County Highway authority stating their interest in the scheme.

There are many walkers and dog owners in the area who would appreciate good long country walks. How delightful it would be to walk the Parish bounderies on Rogation Sunday. Think of the fund raising that could take place from such a sponsored walk.


In the Semi-Finals, Wrestlingworth had four representatives: The team went out to Stevington 37-12.

# RECIPE PAGE

Spring is the time for lamb. So here is a suggested lamb dish to feed 8.

4oz Roquefort cheese
8 Ioin lamb chops, cut about 22" thick
1 level teasp salt
1 teasp Worcestershire sauce
10 oz can of condensed consomme
Pinch of pepper

- 1. With a fork, stir and mash the cheese in a small bowl with the salt, Worcestershire sauce and pepper until well mixed.
- 2. Trim the chops, leaving only a thin layer of fat. Place the chops on a rack in the grill pan. Grill for 8-10 mins on each side.
- 3. Hold each chop with tongs and spread the Roquefort mixture evenly over the outer edges of the chops. Arrange the chops in a shallow flame proof dish, mixture side up. Pour over the undiluted consomme and grill for a further 2-3 minutes, or until the cheese has melted and is bubbling and the sauce is hot.

Serve with new potatoes and whole small carrots.

# GARDENERS PAGE

Spring, the time for renewal, and an opportunity to put right some of the mistakes of last year.

Seed sowing must go on, to delay could spoil the display in the flower garden. Cut back straggly evergreen shrubs to encourage new growth/from the base. Prune hardy fuchsias, buddleias and other shrubs which flower/on current seasons growth~o two or three buds from base. Roses should have all been pruned by now. Tie in new growth on climbing and rambling roses.

Alpines planted now will quickly establish themselves. If the weather is settled and reasonably mild aquatic plants such as water lillies can go in now. If cold wait a bit longer.

Lawns need aerating, especially on well trodden areas. Reseed bare patches and fertilise generally. With the start of grass cutting now is the time to start your new compost heap.

If, like mine your greenhouse is unheated, and therefore likely to be used as an extension to the garden shed in the winter, it should now be very well cleaned out. Normally our tomatoes and cucumbers have been grown in grow bags. Last year ring culture was introduced. Much

less chance of spoilt fruit because of lack of water. I recommend this method of growing to you. If it is your first time ask at your local garden centre for advise.
