

SOLAR FARM PROPOSAL BACK ON THE TABLE

Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) has concluded the first stage of a proposal to install solar panels across a large area of countryside in between Wrestlingworth and Eyeworth. We recently revealed in our newsletter (and online), how CBC was being asked to consider a 'scoping report' for an 80 hectare solar farm just outside Wrestlingworth (see map on page 18). This is the first stage and is not consideration of the application itself. This preliminary planning stage indicates to the applicant which potential reports would be required further down the line and CBC has now made them aware of what will be needed.

The last article generated significant interest and some asked what the benefits might be to local residents, so we approached the applicant.

The company involved told us that if they pursued the application they would be creating lots more reports and these would be made public e.g. landscape, ecological, trees, heritage, archaeological, noise, glint and glare, roads and drainage.

They said once these had been completed they would conduct a public consultation process with local residents before any application is finalised and submitted. This would likely include:

- Providing information to every household within 1km of the site boundaries
- Adverts in the local press
- A public exhibition at Wrestlingworth Village Hall
- Seeking public feedback via a website

They said the solar farm, would produce enough electricity (50MW) to power 13,500 households and will offset 21,681 tonnes of carbon emissions annually. They are also planning storage to allow power to be fed into the grid at peak times.

They said in terms of benefits to local residents, the following are being considering:

- Discounted energy for residents of Wrestlingworth (such a scheme has been conducted abroad but would require regulatory approval in the UK, so is not a given)
- Protection against power cuts

- The potential to own part of the solar facility
- Up to 50 acres of agricultural land to be reclassified as a nature reserve, with public access. This could potentially act as a significant visual buffer between the village and the solar farm.
- Section 106 money for local road improvements We have also investigated what happened with their other project in Cambridgeshire. At Vine Farm, Shingay-cum-Wendy I understand a significant sum of money was invested in setting up the nature reserve and it seems local residents had input into how this was created. I am also told that, for a small sum of money, residents became a part-owner. Exact details would need to be confirmed but it seems the solar plant provided the village company with a portion of the energy sales. And these funds are delivered for the maintenance of the nature reserve and other local investments chosen by the village company.

Of course, detail on this would likely be a part of any planning application.

The applicant said that further down the line they would work with residents concerned about solar panels being too close to their homes and said that if they can get the same output by moving them around a little, they'd be happy to consider this.

It's worth re-iterating that nothing is likely to happen immediately as the reports will take time and as soon as any public consultation is confirmed, we'll let you know.

Only after the consultation would any planning application go in, and at that stage, residents would get the chance to formally send comments to CBC.

Watch this space.

MY BACKYARD

... is also your backyard. Nicola Adkins asks if it's not local people who will protect the environment that surrounds them, then who will?

The term NIMBY (the acronym for Not In My Back Yard) is often thrown lazily back at anyone who opposes development of any sort. I say 'lazily' because such an accusation often fails to take into account the many reasons why someone might object to a change in their local surroundings. Such are the current pressures on greenfield sites from landowners and developers to maximise their asset, and local councils to meet their housing targets, who have no connection to or affinity with their land target, that it naturally falls to local people to consider whether such a change is appropriate, or not.

You may know that there is, yet again, a proposal to build a solar farm in Wrestlingworth, although a full planning application has yet to be submitted. At the first sniff of an objection to this proposal, the accusations of 'nimbyism' began to fly. But it's not nimbyist to suggest that solar panels should be up on rooves not down on high-grade farmland. It's not nimbyist to suggest that habitat for red-list bird species should be sacrificed for no comparable environmental return. Nor is it nimbyist to want to enjoy regular walks in the surrounding countryside without the constant hum of transformers every twenty or so metres.

No reasonable person objects to alternative, renewable power. We need it, desperately. Wind turbines have a natural place on England's flat lands. I have never understood, however, why as a country we don't harness more wave power instead of solar: we are surrounded by water and yet the appearance of proper sun in the UK is a cause for celebration.

Yes, I am one of the residents living closest to the site of this proposal. Yes, I don't want it, but for all the reasons outlined above, not just because it's in my 'backyard'. (On page 18, a graphic shows what the proposed solar farm might look like when viewed from Wrestlingworth, and is used with permission.)

PLANT A TREE FOR THE JUBILEE

Karen Greenway of the Parish Walking & Wildlife Group provides an update on recent hedge-planting at Lousy Bush.

To celebrate the platinum jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II it was decided to encourage everyone to plant trees during 2022. These would contribute to the 'Queen's Green Canopy', an eco-project aimed at creating woodland "in honour of the Queen's service". (Queen Elizabeth probably planted more trees in her lifetime than any other

individual.) The project aims to create a 'green' legacy "bringing benefits for people, wildlife and climate, now and for the future". The Woodland Trust encouraged schools and community groups to take part by offering free tree or hedging packs.

PWWG, in consultation with some members of the Parish Council, decided that the village should take part. The question was where to plant?

The only suitable land owned by the Parish Council is Lousy Bush local nature reserve as all other green spaces are leased from Central Beds. Planting larger trees didn't seem appropriate as we didn't want to alter the nature of the reserve. However, the fencing by the access gate on the bridleway had been flattened this seemed an ideal spot to fill with a hedge. In March 2022, we put in a bid for a hedging pack of 30 trees to

replace the missing 8m of fencing. Our application was successful but as the best time to plant trees is between November and March it was long wait before the saplings to arrive.

As preparation is the key to successful planting, a small group of PWWG volunteers headed to the reserve earlier in the week to clear the ground of weeds. This proved to be harder than anticipated in places as we were not just removing nettles but the remains of the wire fence and buried masonry. However, perseverance paid off and on December 3rd a slightly larger group were able to plant our 30 saplings. The crab apples, hazel, hawthorn, dog rose and dogwood will not only look more appealing but will provide extra resources for the local wildlife.

Shortly afterwards the Woodland Trust contacted us to say that the project had been extended into 2023 and to ask if we had room for more trees. The rest of the fence along this edge of the reserve is also unstable so watch this space......

PICK UP YOUR POOCH'S POO!

A number of concerned residents have been in touch regarding dog faeces on footpaths and lanes around the village. Of particular concern is the fouling of routes that children take to school. The resulting unpleasantness, not to mention possible risk to health, doesn't bear thinking about.

One resident has been moved to contact Central Beds Council and the Parish Council. It was suggested new signage - to remind people of their moral responsibilities - may help. It remains to be seen what could be done.

It is the dog owner's responsibility to clean up after their animal. Failure to do so is an offence carrying a £100 fixed penalty and a possible £1,000 fine if reported to C.B.C. Dog poo bags are very cheap and readily available, so there is little excuse for owners not to carry them when walking their dog. And needless to say, use an appropriate bin or take the dog's poo home. Even if you bag it, you will still be committing a littering offence if you do not deal with it responsibly.

Here are some of the most common potential health risks to humans of all ages associated with exposure to dog mess:

- All varieties of worm Heart, Whip, Hook, Round and Tape
- Parvovirus
- Giardiasis
- Salmonella
- Cryptosporidium
- Campylobacter

The agents causing such conditions survive well beyond the stage when the mess is dry, for days or even weeks after being deposited - another reason why instant removal by dog owners is crucial.

Most women who have been pregnant will know about Toxoplasmosis which can cause complications to the eyes, nervous system, skin and ears in newborn babies. Cats are definitely hosts to Toxoplasmosis, but less well known is that dogs are intermediate hosts meaning that infection can also be passed on through their faeces.

A WALK AROUND WRESTLINGWORTH, REVISITED. (PART 5) BY BRIAN BUCK

Before we get on with the next stage of the walk, I would just like to update you on a couple of things which have changed since my last article. Firstly, although they are not visible in abundance, there are now a few more chickens to be seen as you walk past the hen houses at Church Farm. I suspect that this still has much to do with the remnants of the "bird 'flu" which has been going around.

Also, in my last article I mentioned that as you approach the thatched cottage at Water End and after you cross the brook there, you immediately have to turn right, as there is no other option, but before you almost immediately turn left, there is an old tree stub, covered in fungi. At the time it was so pretty to look at. But within a week or so of spotting this, it looked as though it had been poisoned, intentionally or not. If it was intentional then I can understand the reasons as to why, However, if it was destroyed by 'natural causes' then it is a shame, because it was so colourful.

Lastly, I mentioned the brook, which up until mid-October had been near enough devoid of water due to the lack of rain during the summer. This seemed to be the signal for us to have some prolonged rain and not only that but the melting of the snow we had on Sunday 11th December saw it fill up again. By the time one reaches this stage of the walk all the tributaries into it from around the village have fed into it and the flow is at its strongest here. From this point, apart from some overflow water from the nearby sewage farm, no other streams feed into it from our parish and it goes on to pass under the Wrestlingworth to Eyeworth road, where the double bend is, before heading off to the Mordens.

Before leaving Water End, which, like Mill End, is almost a hamlet in itself, I want to mention Cow Lane, which runs from High Street (originally Town Street) to the aforementioned thatched cottage at Water End. If coming into the village from the crossroads this is where you can see signs to the first (of two) turnings into Water End. But they are both little more than tracks and I am not sure if the first of these is actually called Cow Lane any more. In the past there were other thatched cottages here as well and also the now longgone William IV pub was in this vicinity.

Also in this area is Home Farm and it is the oldest surviving property in Wrestlingworth. I do not know too much about it these days, but its entrance can be located on the opposite side of the road to and very close to the former site of Cow Lane. The farm building was thought to be erected in the 15th

century. The original structure was one large hall with a moat. A second floor was added at a later date and there is said to be an old brick-built dovecote in the grounds.

Anyway, on with the walk and after crossing the brook, work your way round the back of the thatched cottage (into what was Cow Lane) and then enter the field in front of you on your right through the easy to see swing gate, enhanced by its yellow signage. You are now entering the least wellmaintained part of our walk and as such, you do need to tread carefully. Firstly, keep right and after no more than 30 yards you see another swing gate, preceded by what can be some very muddy and uneven ground. Go through the swing gate and immediately turn left, following the narrow pathway. Then continue down the next stretch, which has fields, often containing horses in it, to your right and bushes to your left, which contain brambles. Sometimes they are not trimmed frequently and another hazard are the rabbit holes, which walkers should take extra care to make sure they keep their footing here. Then you reach the back gardens of the houses in Eveworth Road and although the footpath now widens, this part is a haven for not only some very pretty looking plants with blue flowers, the name of which I know not, but in season, also some stinging nettles, which are often left untrimmed for far too long, making it difficult for walkers wading through them.

But if you survive, you soon come out onto Eyeworth Road. Turn left and head off to the crossroads. As mentioned before, unless you want to, do not take the tarmac footpath back to the centre of the village, but instead head straight for the road and almost immediately take the signed footpath opposite. You now enter what I call a spinney and somewhere in here, or nearby, you may be able to spot what is locally known as The Three Elms which, if they are still there, are a trio of magnificent pollarded trees. Once a common tree, it is now a rarity to see such large specimens, apparently immune to the fungus borne by the Dutch elm beetle.

Join me again next time when I reveal more finds from my walks around the village.

TRIAL AND ERROR COOKING BY GORDON BLUE (ASSISTED BY EGON RONNIE)

DATE AND BANANA TART (Serves four people)

Ingredients:-

Enough plain flour to make a pastry base for a 21 cm diameter baking dish.

Couple of generous knifefuls of butter or margarine

Small amount of milk, probably about 50 mls max

Small amount of sugar for sweetening purposes

A generous handful of dates, stoned and chopped up

3 bananas, mashed up until they are mashed to a pulp

3 eggs

3 heaped tablespoons of self-raising flour

200g of Greek style yogurt or any plain yogurt

Method:-

Make the pasty: Rub the margarine or butter into the flour until it looks like breadcrumbs. Slowly add the milk and knead the dough until it becomes pastry and is capable of being rolled with a rolling pin. Roll and place in the base of the baking dish, but don't trim off any excess pastry yet as the ingredients to be added will help fill out the base.

Then, in a separate bowl, mix the pulped bananas with the eggs. Then after adding the sugar, slowly add the self-raising flour until it is all mixed together. Finally, stir in the chopped dates so that they are all covered by the remaining ingredients.

Then, after trimming off the excess pastry, cook the tart at about 190C until the top goes golden brown, probably for about 20 to 25 minutes and after allowing it to cool a little, serve with the yogurt. You can test to see if it is done by either sticking your finger in the middle of it, or by noting if it has risen or not.

Egon Ronnie comments:-

This is quite tasty, whether served hot or cold. You can vary the ingredients as well. Do not throw away the unused pastry as it can be frozen and used later. What you have made here is really a cake mix without using butter or margarine.
